As a Writer in Residence for the RAF Museums, his experience in libraries, bookselling, charity work, his passion for sports and his humour made him an engaging speaker.

When visiting our academy his ambition and determination was evident when discussing his books with the groups of years 7, 8 and 9 who attended. Tom had been taking part in author visits throughout the pandemic and when not

possible - had been doing online virtual events like many others. Tom's books and his work ethic made this event a great example for our students in 'keep going.'

The buzz the event created in the academy prior to the visit was brilliant. Tom's own journey become a successful author from his childhood as a reluctant reader resonated with both staff and pupils. Sharing his research processes, basing his most recent







work on true stories during the WWII. Engaging students with a fascinating Q & A session. Tom's main message throughout when asked was – "Don't give up! **Keep going!**" saying how much hard work goes into following your dreams.

Students and staff thoroughly enjoyed the visit with the unique opportunity to have their books dedicated and signed.

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
BOOK REVIEWS

When the World Was Ours




By definition, grace is love and care for our fellow peers Glory stipulates that state of being proud and heard through ear There's no time to stand and stare

A stunning poem winning against other stunning pieces of art like these: Autumn C (Year 7), Joseph B-S (Year 8), and Victoria M (Year 8).










Module two kicked off with The Masked Reader cunningly created by our wonderful Miss Johnson. Students were given a disguised face, and sometimes a hidden voice, and were

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GLOBAL CITIZENSHIP

In light of the recent pandemic and statutory changes, we have evaluated our personal development provision at the Academy. We have decided to use the term 'Global Citizenship' as an umbrella phrase for the knowledge and skills which will prepare our students to grow in an ever changing and complex world and therefore prepare them to become global citizens.

Global Citizenship includes developing a student's Social, Moral, Spiritual and Cultural (SMSC) education, understanding of British Values, Sex and Relationship Education, Living in the Wider World (including Careers), Health and Wellbeing; and the Academy Values.

During tutorial, all students look at weekly topics to develop their SMSC awareness. These have included reflecting on the recent Ukraine/Russia conflict, International Women's Day, Diwali and Chinese New Year.

Students at Lincoln are supported in their journey to become a global citizen through both a taught curriculum and the opportunities and experiences they are offered. This academic year, all students have had a bi-weekly lesson 'Global Citizenship' and also two Global Citizenship days. The students have learnt about relationships and sex, health and wellbeing and also careers.

On the Global Citizenship days we have had the pleasure of welcoming numerous external visitors. The 'Stay Safe Partnership' delivered a variety of topics to Year 8 and Year 10 including road safety, online safety, alcohol awareness and healthy relationships. Year 8 also learnt basic sign language and took part in a session of inclusive sports which included New Age curling. Year 7 were taught basic life-saving skills and were able to practice on resuscitation manikins. Year 9 had sessions from the charity 'Positive Health' about the importance of consent and also Prison a Reality and the Magistrates in the Community sessions on the law and criminal responsibility. Year 10 and Year 11 undertook some







being.

The Academy also welcomed the National Citizenship Service (NCS) to talk to our Year 11 students about the opportunity they have to take part in the NCS Summer Program which includes a residential trip and volunteering.

We are delighted that following on from this session a number students have applied to be part of this brilliant program.

The Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership called '2fast2soon' delivered a thought provoking and educational interactive session to Year 12 and 13 about road safety. The session is based on a real-life road collision and includes key learning points. Set in a Crown Court, '2fast2soon' depicts a trial of an offender charged with causing death by dangerous driving with sixth form students taking on the role of the jury.

Students will continue over the next two modules having bi-weekly Global Citizenship lessons. Our next Global Citizenship day is called our 'World of Work Day' which is focussed around careers.

WAYS TO FEEL GOOD ON SOCIAL MEDIA

At Lincoln Academy we are building a community that is inclusive, kind and resilient. There are times however where some students are challenged by what they see online and what they should share online. One of Childline's webpages has some great advice that will help all of us to stay safe online and encourages us to #bekind.

THINKING ABOUT WHAT YOU SHARE

A big part of social media is sharing things about your life. But it's also important to think carefully about what you let other people see - especially if your account on YouTube, Instagram or any social media site is public.



We've got advice to make sure you feel good about what you're sharing:

Ask before you share photos of other people

When you share a photo of someone else on social media, you lose control of how other people might share it and who else could see it.

There are lots of reasons someone might not want a photo of themselves online. They might feel self-conscious or embarrassed, or worry about how other people will react.

Asking someone's permission to share a photo of them before you do it gives them the chance to say no. And it can stop them getting upset or angry at you if they don't want their photo shared.

Think about how other people might react



Lots of people say things online that they wouldn't say in person. And the things you say can have a big effect.

Before you share things online, think about how other people might react and feel. Even when you're joking, people can take what you've said seriously.

The BBC Own It app can help you decide whether you should share something online, and how you want to respond to other people.

Remember, when you share something on social media, you lose control of it. Even if your account is private or you're using an app like Snapchat, people can screenshot or repost what you've shared.

If you've shared something online you're unhappy with and you're not sure what to do follow the same advice:

If someone is sharing photos of you without your permission there are things you can do

- 1. Talk to someone you trust like an adult,
- 2. Report bullying and abuse directly to the website or app
- 3. Delete things you've shared that you're worried about, or find ways to hide them
- 4. Tell the police by making a report to CEOP if someone is threatening or blackmailing you
- 5. Plan for the future and change your privacy settings so it doesn't happen again

"If in doubt, don't post"



ASTRO PI – MISSION ZERO

The European Space Agency (ESA) asked young people all over Europe and Canada to write a simple computer program to take a humidity reading on board the International Space Station (ISS). The young people were then asked to communicate the information to the astronauts, along with a personalised message, which will be displayed for thirty seconds on board the ISS.



The coding will run on Astro Pi computers which are being used to measure humidity (how much water vapour is in the air) on the ISS. The display is an LED panel which the reading should scroll along on. Additionally students have added messages or created pixel art images to display on the panel.



A number of students at the Academy, across a variety of year groups have worked with Mrs Vernon to write and submit their code. We are now looking forward to hearing about their submissions being run on the ISS!



All submissions will be uploaded and run on the ISS whilst it is in orbit. All students involved will receive a certificate showing exactly where in space the ISS was and the time that their piece of code was run. Certificates will be received before the end of June 2022.
